Remember:

- Present Perfect Simple: have/ has + verb past participle
 he / she / it [has] +[verb in participle form]
 I / we / you / they [have] +[verb in participle form]
- Present Prefect Continuous: have/has + been + verb-ing
 he / she / it [has] [been] [verb + "ing"]
 I / we / you / they [have] [been] [verb + "ing"]
