Front page story

Prior knowledge


Ask students what they already know about Nepal from their general knowledge. What is Nepal famous for more than anything else? You should of course be met with shouts of 'Mount Everest'! Point out that Nepal has eight of the world's highest peaks and for a long time has been a mountaineer's dream location. Do any of the students climb? Would they like to have a go at climbing? There should be plenty of discussion in the classroom about why or why not. You could perhaps invite pairs to demonstrate how they might climb a high mountain in pairs. What safety measures could be used?

This will help to set the scene for how tourism has impacted on Nepal. Use the official Nepalese Tourist Board website to show pictures of Nepal, its high peaks and its famous capital, Kathmandu. You might like to highlight the plight of the Sherpas, who risk their lives regularly to make a livelihood.

- 1. The Chitwan National Park (accept National Park)
- **2.** Because it is cruel or because the elephants suffered. Accept any similar answers.
- 3. Accept the idea that the word has deeper meaning – not literally broken, but made to suffer emotional and physical pain.
- 4. Accept: 'using bull hooks and sticks to control them' and 'they stopped using chains to restrain the animals'.
- 5. Accept any answer that includes reference to the following:
 - 'be an honorary member of the herd'
 - opportunity to walk alongside and feed the elephants
 - camp next to them overnight
 - more intimate and personal experience for the tourist.
- **6.** The idea of still being in captivity should form the basis of the explanation.
