<u>Learning Objective:</u> Students will learn how to form and use comparative and superlative adjectives.

Adjectives can compare two things or more than two things. When we make these comparisons, we use **comparative and superlative** forms of adjectives.

An Adjective is a describing word

<u>Comparative:</u> is comparing two nouns, by adding **-er** and **than**, or the words **more** and **less**.

Examples: smaller, bigger, taller, more interesting, and less expensive.

<u>Superlative:</u> is ranking as the **highest** or **lowest** of three or more items by adding **-the** and **-est** or the words **the most**.

Examples: the smallest, the biggest, the tallest, the most interesting, and the least expensive.

For example:

The dog is **big**.

The horse is bigger than the dog.

The elephant is the biggest among the animals.
