

An information text is a piece of non-fiction writing which gives information about a particular thing or place (For example Palestine, volcanoes or tigers). Information texts are sometimes called **nonchronological** (facts are not put in order) because they are giving information about something without mentioning the order in which it happened. These texts do not need to be read from beginning to end.



How do we write information texts?

- 1- Choose your topic and collect your information and facts; you can use books, CD s, internet or interviews.
- 2- Organize your information; using a mind map.
- 3- Plan the features of your text.
- 4-Write the text clearly in the present tense.
- 5- Organize information in clear paragraphs. Start each paragraph with general information (topic sentence), and then add details and specific facts.
